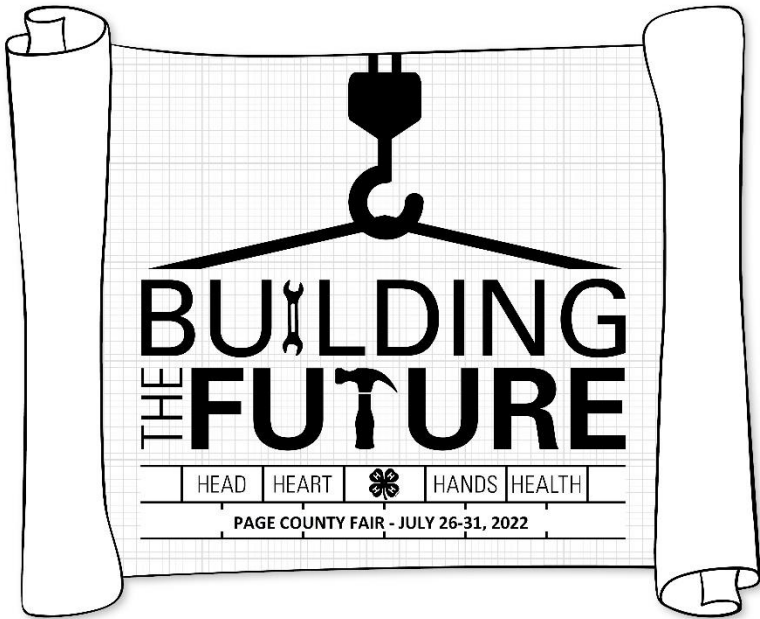

4-H TABLE SETTING CONTEST

This contest is open to all 4-H members. Members do not need to be enrolled in any specific project area to participate. Members may work as individuals or a team of two, with the grade division determined by the oldest of the two members. Members may enter only one setting per division and must bring a card table for the display, except for the picnic table setting which may use a blanket or other covering to be placed on the floor. Clover kids are invited to participate but will not advance to regionals.

Participants are to display one place setting, to include: coverings, dishes, glassware, silverware, centerpiece and menu. Participants should wear clothing matching the theme of their setting. Page County contest will be July 15th. An overall Junior, Intermediate, and Senior individual or Team will be selected to represent our county at the Region 17 4-H Table Setting Contest. Classes are broken down as follows:

KICK-OFF BARBECUE

The annual "benefit" barbecue will be served on Tuesday evening, July 26 at 5:00p.m. in the City Park. Proceeds will go to the Building Improvement Projects. This is being served by the Page County Fair Board and Farm Bureau as a part of their efforts to help raise funds. Other features of the evening's activities will include:

RANCH RODEO – Friday Evening with events as follows:

Pasture Doctoring – Cattle will be held behind cow line. Time starts when the 1st team member crosses cow line and judge drops flag. Announcer immediately calls out number. Team must sort their numbered animal out across cow line, and rope with a legal head catch within 1 minute. One extra cow can cross – no re-cross for designated cow. Cow must be heeled, stretched out and paint stripe on face for call to time. 4 loop limit and additional 5-sec penalty for one leg. Total time is 3 minutes.

Steer Mugging – Time starts when 1st team member crosses cow line and judge drops flag. Announcer immediately calls out number. Team sorts their numbered cow out – one extra cow can cross and after crossing line, must rope with a legal head catch within 1 minute (3 loop limit). Cow must be thrown down, 3 legs tied and head rope off and clear to call for time. Cow must remain tied for 6 seconds. Total time 3 minutes. If a cow falls for is jerked down, it must be day-lighted before thrown and tied.

Steer Branding – Cattle will be held behind cow line. Time starts when 1st team member crosses cow line and judge drops flag. Announcer immediately calls out number. Team must sort their numbered animal across cow line and rope – one extra cow can cross. No re-cross for designated cow. Iron must remain in bucket until rope is off and steer is on side. Time stops when iron is replaced back in bucket.

Trailer Loading – Teams will start from behind primary cow line and secondary start line. Steer will be turned out of chute – flag drops and time starts when steer clears chute. Team has 1 minute for legal head catch (3 loop limit) – drag or drive steer to trailer upright. Steer is loaded when all ropes are cleared of steer and trailer, gate is closed, and all team members are in designated area before time stops. Total time 3 minutes. Cattle cannot be drug by horse onto trailer.

4-H & FFA LIVESTOCK JUDGING CONTEST – THURS JULY 28

Page County FFA Chapters will be sponsoring a judging contest at Clarinda Livestock Auction. Registration will be a 5:30pm with the judging starting at 6:00pm. This event is open to surrounding counties and will consist of classes of market and breeding beef, swine, and lambs. Ribbons will be awarded to the high 10 individuals and teams in each division. A team will consist of four members with the top three scores in each team used to arrive at total team scores. Plaques awarded to the top teams and individual in each division.

 - No individual or group may interrupt the normal activities of the Fair.
 - Handing out literature of any type must be from a rented booth or similar facility.
 - A protest/demonstration must be arranged with The Fair Board.
 - Amplified methods are not allowed at any protest/demonstration.
 - Protesting/demonstrating group or individual shall be responsible for the actions of all persons involved during their event and shall be held responsible for the actions of all persons.
 - Location of a protest/demonstration shall be in the southeast corner of the Horse Barn parking lot.
 - A protest/demonstration shall be allowed between 6:00a.m. to 8:00a.m.
 - The Fair Board shall not be held liable for any actions or activities brought forth by any group or individual participating in a protest/demonstration.

- The Fair Board reserves final and absolute right to interpret these rules and to settle and determine arbitrarily all matters regarding protesting/demonstrating at any event/activity of the Fair Board.

PAGE COUNTY FAIR QUEEN – RULES & REGULATIONS

Superintendent: Melissa Wellhausen

Entries due July 1 at 4 p.m. – Entry Fee: \$20.00 to Fair Board Office

1. Each contestant must be at least 16 years of age and not more than 20 years of age on August 12, 2022, the first day of the Iowa State Fair.
2. Each contestant must be unmarried and must never have been married. Each contestant must never have given birth to a child or be pregnant during their year of reign. Previous winners cannot enter the contest.
3. The Page County Fair Queen must reside in the county. The only exception: she may reside in an adjoining county if most of her activities are in Page County.
4. Each contestant must be an active member of at least one organization in her community – i.e., church groups, Girl Scouts, 4-H, etc. Eligibility is not limited to 4-H membership.
5. No professional model is eligible for the State Fair Contest. (A professional model can be defined as one who has been employed and paid a salary for the specific job of modeling.)
6. A tea held on Friday July 22 at 1:00pm, location pending, during which the Page County Fair Queen will be selected by a committee.
7. Judging will be based on the following points:
 - a. Beauty, charm and poise 30pts

DIVISION I – 4H & FFA

General Rules

1. Competition is limited to enrolled members in good standing of Page County 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters (60% of regular meetings). Exception is FFA members who attend a high school that serves Page County and the FFA member is or was previously enrolled in Page County 4-H Clubs. Members must have had an enrollment online by May 15th.
2. Non livestock exhibitors must be present to exhibit their project to be eligible for awards
3. Moving of projects to use elsewhere must be cleared by a superintendent.
4. All exhibits must be the original work of club members and must be an outgrowth of work done through 4-H or FFA.
5. Premiums will be paid out by the Fair Board after September 30, 2022. 4-H Leaders are responsible for providing check sheets and submitting

documentation to the Page County Extension Office. **NO CORRECTIONS TO PREMIUMS AFTER SEPTEMBER 30th.**

6. No personal golf carts or UTV/ATV allowed on the fairgrounds
7. **ANY VIOLATION OF THE ABOVE, OR FOLLOWING RULES, COULD RESULT IN FORFEITURE OF AWARDS, PREMIUMS, AND IMMEDIATE DISQUALIFICATION FROM EVENTS.**
8. Rules subject to change at discretion of the Fair Board.

DEPARTMENT I – LIVESTOCK

1. All entries must be delivered to the Fair Board Office by 4p.m, July 1st.
2. Stall and pen fees: All livestock will **only use wood chips for bedding.** One bag is included with entry fee. Additional bags available for \$7.00. Beef, Dairy, Horses and Dairy Goats, \$8.00 per head (box stalls, \$15.00). Swine and sheep, \$8.00 per pen. Poultry and rabbits \$2.00 per pen. Beef carcass \$25 for scoring. Swine carcass scoring price will be updated once we know.
3. The following statement must be signed by all exhibitors and their parent or guardian before entry card will be accepted. “We understand and agree that, as owners and exhibitors, we have the care, custody and control of our animals and the we are primarily liable for injuries occurring to the person or property as a result of any act of our animals, and that we have made our own provision for liability insurance to protect ourselves from that liability”.
4. Livestock: All livestock must be enrolled and have their identification report filled with Page County Extension by May 15th. All swine, sheep, market beef and meat goats must have been ear tagged and weighed in at the appropriate time
5. Exhibiting Rule: All members must personally exhibit their own animals. Only in extreme cases will a substitute showman be accepted. Requests for a substitute must be made in writing to the Fair Board. Substitutes must be Page County 4-H or FFA members. Superintendents cannot authorize substitution showmen without Fair Board approval.
6. Entries must be owned by exhibitor, or as modified by state 4-H/FFA rules.
7. No animal, except horses, is eligible to show in more than one division. It must be shown in either 4-H/FFA or the Open Class Division

8. Livestock must be checked in by 8p.m. on Wed, July 25th, unless section rules indicate otherwise, or arrangements have been made with superintendent.
9. **All Livestock coming to the Page County Fair must pay an insurance fee. You have a choice of how much Insurance to purchase. This will come in your entry fee:** Poultry and Rabbits - \$1.50 per head for market value of \$10; Goats and Sheep \$2.00 per head for market value of \$100; Swine \$2.00 per head for market value of \$200; Market Beef - \$12 per head for market value of \$1,200, \$15 per head for market value of \$1,500, \$18 per head for market value of \$1,800; Horses - \$6 per head for market value of \$600, \$9 per head for market value of \$900, \$12 per head for market value of \$1,200; Breeding Stock – Beef & Dairy \$12 per head for market value of \$1,200, \$15 per head for market value of \$1,500, \$18 per head for market value of \$1,800. This insurance is for DEATH of livestock, condemned carcass entry, or injury that would result in DESTRUCTION of the animal. All salvage becomes property of the Page County Fair Board. Horses must be taken to a vet to determine extent of injury before a claim is filed.
10. Portable generators, power washers and misters are not authorized inside livestock buildings. Blocking chutes must be in assigned areas. Cattle blocking chutes will not be allowed in the cattle barn. Fans will be allowed at the discretion of the Fair Board.
11. All sheep shown will be shown as “slick shorn” sheep. To help with gain and development of the sheep, they should be regularly shorn by the end of June. All sheep must be shorn within 5 days of the fair.
12. Grooming Regulations: It is the intent that the 4-Her & FFA member take responsibility for caring for and grooming his/her own animal. If assistance is needed it should be aimed at helping the 4-Her & FFA member learn new skills and be done by a family member and/or another Iowa 4-Her & FFA member. Family members include and are limited to parent/legal guardian, grandparents, brother, sister or step sibling.
13. Animals may not be colored, dyed, or painted, or have their carcass tampered with. Animals showing evidence of these actions will not be judged.
14. **Feeding and Care of Animals: From the time of weigh in on all market beef, swine and sheep, and from May 15 on all other animals, the animal(s) must be owned and cared for directly by the**

4-H/FFA member until the County Fair. This includes all dogs and other pets.

15. PUREBRED BEEF HEIFER registration papers or proof of registration must be submitted to the beef superintendent on Thursday, July 28th and these animals must be registered in 4-H and FFA members name or show logical family relationship. Animals not meeting these requirements will exhibit in the Commercial Division.
16. ALL SWINE entries must be ear tagged and notched in each ear according to the approved marking system and corresponding with the entry record.
17. ALL RABBITS must be tattooed and recorded on 4-H or FFA Identification Sheet on file at the Extension Office. Breed of rabbit must be indicated on the entry form.
18. **NO STALLIONS WILL BE HOUSED, EXHIBITED, OR PERMITTED ON THE FAIR GROUNDS.** Foals are not considered to be stallions until one year old. Horses can only be shown in the county in which the 4-H member who has 75% management resides.
19. All 4-H related horse events across the state of Iowa require the use of ASTM/SEI approved protective headgear for horses with chin strap and properly fitted harness when mounted and riding and driving. All 4-Her's are required to always wear an approved ASTM/SEI horse helmet during all 4-H related events. **EVERY TIME, EVERY RIDE. Participants in these 4-H related events will be eliminated if helmets are not worn.**
20. Only exhibitors are all owed to ride horses while on the fairgrounds, and only in designated areas. There will be no riding allowed in the Horse Barn.
21. Livestock exhibits cannot be removed from the fairgrounds until 10p.m., Saturday, July 30th. Livestock NOT selling in auction must be removed from the barns by 1p.m., Sunday, July 31st. Tie-outs and swine will be at the discretion of the Fair Board or sale committee.
22. If livestock is removed before 10p.m., Saturday, July 30th, consequences are:
 - Loss of premium money, trophies, banners, awards, etc.
 - Stripped of title
 - Can no longer participate in Page County Fair actions with any animals that year
 - **Cannot show at the Iowa State Fair**
 - 4-H'er may not show at the Page County Fair for 1 year

23. All pens or stalls must be cleaned to the satisfaction of the superintendent. **All 4-H'ers are required to clean up their stalls by 2p.m., Sunday, July 31st, or within a half an hour after animals are removed and must check out with assigned superintendent. This is mandatory in order to receive premiums.**
24. Livestock exhibitors are requested to have their livestock in their assigned pens between 6p.m. to 9p.m. for public view.
25. No uncastrated male animals may be exhibited at the Fair. Exceptions are cow/calf pair, dogs, cats, and other pets.
26. 4-H/FFA Exhibitors must wear a Page County 4-H/FFA, or plain white, T-Shirt and long pants when exhibiting livestock, dog, or pet project. Horse exhibitors may wear a long-sleeved white or plain colored button up shirt.
27. On their respective days, animals showing that day have priority over the wash rack until noon.
28. All Market Beef Cattle cannot have horns over 2" unless breed related.
29. Each family may place one blocking chute under the lean-to, all others will be placed outside. No reserving spaces for chutes before Tuesday. If spaces are left over, a family can request more.
30. Stall dividers are allowed but must be made according to Fair Board specifications. No frames/dividers can be used to hang fans.
31. All animals need to always stay within their designated areas. **No dogs or pets are allowed in the livestock barns at any time. No exception to this will be made.**
32. Any animals unloaded before check-in time and not vet checked will be disqualified and not allowed to show.
33. **Ractopamine is banned from the Page County Fair.** Any hog that exhibits at the Page County Fair must be 100% free of ractopamine. Exhibitors and parents must sign an affidavit that they have not and will not use ractopamine and must also attend an education meeting on the drug in order to exhibit at the Page County Fair.

IAFE NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

1. I will do my own work, appropriate for my age and physical and mental development. This includes research and writing of exhibit explanations, preparing exhibits, care and grooming of animals, etc. Adult assistance should help guide and support me, not do the work for me.

2. All exhibits will be a true representation of my work. any attempt to take credit for other's work, alter the conformation of animals, or alter their performance is prohibited. copyright violation or allowing others to complete you exhibit is considered misrepresentation and is prohibited.
3. I will treat all people and animals with respect and provide appropriate care for animals.
4. I will present exhibits that are safe for consumption. All food exhibits will be safe to exhibit and for judges to evaluate. Other exhibits will be safe for judges to evaluate and for exhibition.
5. All food animals that may be harvested immediately following the show shall be safe for consumers and shall have met all withdrawal times for all medications and be free of violative drug residue.
6. If any animal requires medical treatment while at the fair or exhibition, only a licensed veterinarian may administer the treatment. All medications that are administered shall be done according to the label instructions of the medication used.
7. My animal's appearance or performance shall not be altered by any means, including medications, external applications and surgical procedures. ny animal that is found to have changed its appearance or its performance shall be disqualified from the show, and have penalties assessed against the exhibitor, parent and/or guardian by the management of the fair or exhibition.
8. I will follow all ownership and possession rules and, if requested, will provide the necessary documentation.
9. I will follow all livestock health requirements for this fair or exhibition, according to the state health requirements as printed in the premium book of the fair or exhibition. I will provide animal health certificates from a licensed veterinarian upon request from the management of the fair or exhibition.

By my entering an animal in this fair or exhibition, I am giving consent to the management of the fair or exhibition to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. If the laboratory report on the analysis of any sample indicates a presence of forbidden drugs, this shall be used as evidence a substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and

preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the exhibitor, parent and/or guardian to prove otherwise.

10. I am responsible for my exhibit and I will not allow others to violate this code on my behalf. By my entering an exhibit in this fair or exhibition I will accept any disciplinary action taken by the management of this fair or exhibition for any violation of this code of ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or exhibition without recourse against the fair or exhibition.
11. I want my exhibit to be an example of how to accept what life has to offer, both good and not so good, and how to live with and learn from the outcome.
12. I will not be involved in any illegal activities while participating in 4-H and FFA events, including but not limited to alcohol, tobacco or drug use.

Any youth who breaks the code of ethics or allows another person (adult or peer) to talk them into violating the code of ethics agrees to forfeit all prize awards and premiums. The youth may also be prohibited from exhibiting at this and future exhibitions including the Iowa State Fair and other county, state, or regional exhibitions

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITION OF LIVESTOCK, POULTRY AND BIRDS AT A COUNTY 4-H/FFA FAIR

ANY EVIDENCE OF CONTAGIOUS OR INFECTIOUS CONDITION WILL ELIMINATE THE ANIMAL FROM THE SHOW

-No individual Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required on Iowa origin animals or poultry. All animals must be inspected when unloaded or shortly thereafter by an accredited veterinarian. Swine are required to be inspected either before unloading or before leaving a designated isolation and inspection area. All animals moving from out of state into an Iowa county fair must meet Iowa Animal and Livestock Importation requirements. Each show will have an official veterinarian.

-Quarantined animals or animals from quarantined herds cannot be exhibited.

-Official identification listed on Certificate of Veterinary Inspection required for all cattle and bison of any age **coming in from out of state** that are used in rodeos, recreational events, shows, and exhibitions.

SWINE

All swine must originate from a herd or area not under quarantine and must have official, individual identification. 4-H and FFA tags bearing the US Shield are official identification tags.

Swine originating outside of Iowa. All exhibitors must present a test record and Certificate of Veterinary Inspection that indicate that each swine has had a negative test for pseudorabies within 30 days prior to the show, regardless of the status of the herd, and that show official, individual identification on the test report. Electronic identification will not be considered official identification for exhibition purposes.

Swine Exhibition Requirements. “Swine Exhibition” means an exhibit, demonstration, show, or competition involving an event on the state or county fairgrounds, or other exhibition events. The sponsor of the exhibition must retain an Iowa licensed veterinarian to supervise the health of the swine at the location. Sponsors must electronically file the approved registration form and obtain approval from the state veterinarian at least 30 days before the event. This registration form includes the telephone number of the veterinarian and the date of the planned exhibition. Sales of swine will not be allowed without registration and approval.

Swine Exhibition Report Required. The sponsor of the swine shall electronically submit to the department the approved report form within five business days after the conclusion of the event. The form includes the telephone number for the event, as well as the name and location; name, address and telephone number of veterinarian; date that the event occurred; name, address and number of the swine owner; and address and number of the premises from which the swine was moved after the exhibition.

SHEEP AND GOATS

All sexually intact sheep must have an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin ID tag or other official Scrapie tag. All sexually intact goats must be identified with an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin ID tag, other official Scrapie tag, or by an official tattoo registered with the USDA. **Wethers less than 18 months of age are required to have an individual identification and a scrapie tag may be used for this purpose, but a scrapie tag is not required for this group.**

POULTRY AND BIRDS

All poultry exhibited must come from a U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid clean or equivalent flock, or have had a negative Pullorum-Typhoid test within 90 days

of show and must have been performed by an authorized tester. **No exceptions from this test.**

“Market Classes” of poultry consigned to a slaughter establishment are exempt from Salmonella testing requirements. All “Market Classes” of poultry must be separated from all other poultry by ten or more feet and/or eight-foot-high solid partitions.

DOGS AND CATS

All Dogs and Cats must have current rabies vaccination certificates turned into the Extension office by May 15, 2022.

LIVESTOCK SALE

1. A sale of market livestock exhibitors desiring to sell will be held as follows: The auction will begin at 2pm. Hogs and sheep will be sold in order of placing. First and second place market beef in each class will be sold first based on order of placing. Only blue-ribbon calves may qualify to sell as first and second place in the sale. Order of sale will be determined by drawing. **Limitation on sale: 4-H & FFA**

members will be allowed to sell only one animal of each species shown at fair (poultry, rabbits, market sheep, swine and market beef). Any animal entering the sale ring will be sold. Swine not selling in the auction will go to a packer buyer at market price bids. Arrangements for sheep and beef will be provided if details can be worked out with buyers.

2. Exhibitors must be present to take their livestock through the sale arena or receive prior permission from Fair Board or they forfeit selling opportunities.
3. Exhibitors are responsible for picking up the ribbon(s) to be presented to the buyer(s) of their livestock. These will be available immediately following the sale of your project. These should not be delivered at sale but to buyer's place of business if possible. Checks will be sent when the card indicating delivery of the ribbon to the buyer is received and the clerk received the money from the buyer. There will be a 1% charge on all livestock handled. This fee and the cost of the sale certificate to the buyer will be deducted from the checks.
4. Members must have exhibited the animal in the show arena for it to be eligible to sell through the auction.
5. All swine sold through the auction must go directly to slaughter. Swine must weigh 235 pounds or more on July 27 to sell at auction.
6. Sheep must weigh 96 pounds or more on July 21 to sell at auction
7. Market beef animals must weigh 900 pounds on July 27 to sell at auction
8. Cattle being sold at auction or as tie out cattle can not be watered after announced time on Sunday, July 31. Violation of this rule will forfeit right of 4-H or FFA member to sell at auction.
9. Rabbits and Poultry – Each exhibitor will be allowed to sell one rabbit and one poultry in the Livestock Auction on July 31. Those who wish to sell rabbit or poultry at the auction must report to the superintendent by Wednesday evening, July 27, or they will not be eligible to sell.
10. Exhibitors must be dressed in proper showmanship clothing to sell livestock
11. Order of livestock sale will be rotated each year. 2022 order: Rabbit
Beef, Sheep, Poultry, Swine
12. Animals offered for sale in animal auction are considered to have changed ownership. This applies even if bought back by original owner or if the owner refuses a bid or says “no sale”.

1. Any newborn or orphan calf, steer or heifer, dairy or beef that is calved between Mar 1 and May 15 may be shown. If purchased, the calf must be purchased and in possession of exhibitor within 2 weeks of birth; identified by a photo and identified on livestock ID form that is due to the Fair Board Office by May 15.
2. Calf must be bucket or bottle fed. No nursing permitted after 2 weeks of birth
3. Claves are to be shown at halter
4. Superintendent may combine or divide entries
5. Calves will be brought in on judging day (Friday, July 29th) and taken home the day of the show. They cannot be sold at the fair sale.
6. Bucket/Bottle exhibits must follow the fair rules and health requirements as stated in the fair book.
7. Third graders may keep Bucket/Bottle calf for breeding heifer, or market beef for classes next year.
8. Oral interviews will be held on Friday, July 29th with knowledge, health, and showmanship being evaluated in a show ring evaluation.
9. NO clipping and fitting of calves.
10. NO late entries will be accepted. All animals must be ID'd by May 15th.

Judging will be based on:

- A. What a youth has learned about the care and management of raising the calf.
- B. Showing the calf, with emphasis on what the youth has learned.
- C. Cleanliness, general health, condition and management of the calf and the exhibitor's knowledge in this area.

- D. Quality and conformation of the calf will not be considered. Trophies will be awarded to the first three places in each category. A cash award will be given to the top overall places in each age category. Everyone will receive a participation ribbon.

Rules and Guidelines

1. Project is open to Pre-4-H members, kindergarten, first, second, and third grade as of Sept. 15th.
Any newborn or orphan lamb that is born between Feb 1 and May 1 may be shown. If purchased, the lamb must be purchased and in possession of exhibitor within 2 weeks of birth; identified by a photo; and identified on a Livestock ID form that is due to the Fair Board Office by May 15th.
2. Lamb must be bucket or bottle fed. No nursing permitted after 2 weeks of birth.
3. Exhibitor may identify two animals but is limited to a maximum of one lamb to be exhibited at the county fair.
4. Lambs are to be shown at halter.
5. Superintendent may combine or divide entries.
6. Lambs will be brought in on judging day, Friday, July 29th, 2022, and taken home the day of the show. They cannot be sold at the fair sale.
7. Bucket/Bottle exhibits must follow the fair rules and health requirements as stated in the fair book.
8. Third graders may keep Bucket/Bottle lamb for breeding sheep, or market sheep for classes in 2023.
9. Oral interviews will be held on Friday, July 29th with knowledge, health and showmanship being evaluated in a show ring evaluation.
10. Lambs should be sheared once before showing.
11. A 4-H lamb may not be shown in the Bottle Lamb show.

BUCKET/BOTTLE GOAT PROGRAM

1. Project is open to Pre-4-H members, kindergarten, first, second, and third graders as of Sept. 15th.
2. Any newborn or orphan goat that is born between Feb 1st and May 1st may be shown. If purchased, the goat must be purchased and in possession of exhibitor within 2 weeks of birth; identified by a photo;

and identified on a Livestock ID form that is due to the Fair Board office by May 15th.

3. Goat must be bucket or bottle fed. No nursing permitted after 2 weeks of birth.
4. Goats are to be shown at halter.
5. Exhibitor may identify two animals, but is limited to a maximum of one goat to be exhibited at the county fair.
6. Superintendent may combine or divide entries.

Goats will be brought in on judging day, Friday, July 29th, and taken home the day of the show. They cannot be sold at the fair sale.

24. Bucket/Bottle exhibitors must follow the fair rules and health requirements as stated in the fair book.
25. Third graders may keep bucket/bottle goat for breeding goats or market goats for classes in 2022.
26. Oral interviews will be held on Friday, July 29th, with knowledge, health, and showmanship being evaluated in a show ring.
27. No clipping and fitting of goats.

GENERAL RULES – WIBHOLM HALLS EXHIBITS

Superintendent: Cheri Wittmuss

1. Exhibit classes are broad categories. To plan exhibits, 4-H'ers are encouraged to use project guides and manuals and program materials to determine goals and learning experiences. Some project manuals include specific exhibit suggestions and procedures. An exhibit can represent a part of all learning involved in the respective project or program. The County Extension Office has more information on exhibiting. Refer to the ISU webpage www.extension.iastate.edu/4H for more information.
2. Eligible exhibits are an outgrowth of the 4-H'ers participation in the selected project or program. Exhibits can be done by an individual or group. Exhibits may be, but are not limited to, an actual product, poster, display box, report, notebook, model, video, or audio recording.
3. Exhibitors in 4-H classes are not eligible to exhibit in a similar department of the FFA divisions or vice-versa.
4. Exhibits previously entered in an FFA Ag Science Fair or any other FFA event or competition may not be entered in any 4-H exhibit class.

5. Exhibits that do not comply with the class description, size guidelines, copyright restrictions, safety and approved methods will be disqualified and not put on public display.
6. If the exhibitor chooses a display to illustrate what was learned:
 - a. Posters may not exceed 24" x 36" in size.
 - b. Chart boards, graph boards, project presentation boards, model displays, etc., may not exceed 48" x 48" in size. Maximum size is determined by measuring the flat (unfolded) dimensions.
 - c. Display boxes may not exceed 28" x 22" in height or width and 12" deep.
7. Endangered and threatened plants and animals (including insects), or songbird feathers and nests may NOT be used in any exhibit. Game animals legally taken are acceptable. Live specimens of noxious or invasive species are NOT permitted. Dried specimens are acceptable to use in exhibits.
8. School projects are allowed to be judged as long as they show further enhancement from the original graded project in school.
9. Copyright materials and designs may not be used in an exhibit that is presented as original work by the exhibitor. Exhibitors must include permission from the copyright holder/owner when using copyrighted materials. Exhibitors must give proper credit to the original to the proper credit to the original source of all materials/designs used in exhibits. (See also special rules for Visual Arts and general copyright information for 4-H'ers.)

10. The 4-H'ers goal and applicable exhibit standards will form the basis of the evaluation process. Evaluation criteria will include demonstrated learning, workmanship and techniques, and general appearance and design. Exhibitors will receive written evaluation comments on the exhibits and a blue, red, or white exhibitor's ribbon. Refer to exhibit class evaluation rubrics for detailed evaluation criteria in each class. Rubrics are located on each 4-H project page at www.extension.iastate.edu/4H/exhibit-tip-sheets.
11. A written explanation, audio recording, or video recording is to be included as part of each exhibit. The exhibitor should respond briefly to the following questions:
 - a. What did you plan to learn or do? (Goals of your exhibit)

- b. What steps did you take to learn or do this?
- c. What were the most important things you learned?

Check for additional requirements in exhibit classes for food and nutrition, photography, and visual art classes

- 13. Exhibits will be judged according to the age level of the member
- 14. Each item in an exhibit must be securely labeled, including the name of the exhibitor and class number. Labels should be placed on the back of posters and cards, and in an inconspicuous place on other items.
- 15. 4-H members from 4-12 grade may exhibit at the Page County Fair, if they were in 4-12 grades by September 20, 2021.
- 16. 4-H'ers who have completed 5 thru 12 grade (or equivalent) in 2022 are eligible to exhibit at the Iowa State Fair. Exception: Group exhibits from an entire club may include 4th grade members.
- 17. Due to security, 4-H'ers are discouraged from sending items that have special meaning and historical value as the exhibits or part of an exhibit.
- 18. The Page County Fair Board and Iowa State University Extension and Outreach will use diligence to insure the safety of articles entered for exhibition after their arrival and placement. However, they will not be responsible for damage or losses.
- 19. Evaluation is Tuesday, July 26, at 8am until judging is complete unless otherwise noted. Club members MUST be evaluated at designated club times unless granted permission in writing by the overall superintendent. There will be a lunch break from 11:45am to 1:00pm.
- 20. Exhibits will be on display July 28th-30th, from 10:00am to 10:00pm. The exhibits may be removed from the area after 10pm, Saturday with permission from the superintendent.
- 21. Entries may also be picked up between 1:00pm and 1:30pm on Sunday. Persons who cannot meet this requirement need to contact their leader to make arrangements. This must be done to receive premium money. The Fair Board, Superintendents, Leaders, or Extension Staff are not responsible for exhibits or booth accessories after 1:30pm Sunday.
- 22. Premiums will be awarded based on ribbon quality, \$2, \$1, \$0.50. Each project judged on Tuesday will receive only one ribbon placement (Considered for State, Blue, Red, White, or Outstanding Junior). Note: First year (4th graded) exhibitors are not eligible for the state fair. However, if the project deserves special recognition for their first year's efforts, the "outstanding junior award" may be given. Outstanding junior ribbons will be given out on judging day when you

turn in your ribbon sheet at the end of the day. Note: Considered for State Fair ribbons will be handed out on Thursday morning in Wibholm between 10am and 12pm. State Fair Ribbons will be handed out at the special exhibitor meeting on Friday in the Ron Sanson Pavilion. Please see fair book general rules for details.

23. Exhibitors whose exhibits have been chosen to represent Page County at the State Fair must attend a meeting concerning special requirements for their entries on Friday, July 29th at 1:30pm in the Ron Sanson Pavilion.
24. Exhibitors will assume responsibility for any damage incurred to articles going to the Iowa State Fair. Exhibitors shall label, pack, and secure projects for transport to the State Fair with the proper paperwork attached.
25. Non-livestock 4-H members must wear a 4-H shirt or a white T-Shirt when exhibiting their projects on judging day. No hats allowed in judging area.
26. All exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with State Fair General Exhibit Rules for the exhibit to be eligible for State Fair participation. Rules can be found at www.extension.iastate.edu/4H.
27. A project may only be judged once. Club historian books will be evaluated in the Club Historian Project area only.
28. Special group project forms are required when a single project is exhibited by two or more 4-H'ers. The project will be evaluated according to the oldest 4-H'er. They need to be enrolled in project areas by May 15th. 4-H'ers may be from different clubs.
29. Prepared foods should be placed on a firm, disposable plate, or flat cardboard. Place food product exhibit in a re-closable plastic bag with entry tag fastened to bag.
30. 4-H exhibitors that are unable to be present on judging day must notify the superintendent of the project area to have an "absentee" project. The projects will be judged solely on the project and write-up. These absentee projects are not eligible for State Fair consideration. The projects will receive a ribbon placing and may be displayed at the fair in the booth.

Animals – *Max of three entries per exhibitor in this department*

Class 10110 – Animal Science – An exhibit (other than the animal itself) that shows the learning about a large or small animal including beef, dairy cattle, dairy goats, dogs, horse and pony, meat goats, pets, poultry, rabbits, sheep, and swine. Ownership of animal is not required.

Class 10120 – Veterinary Science – An exhibit that shows learning about keeping animals healthy.

Agriculture & Natural Resources – *Max of three entries per exhibitor*

Class 10210 – Crop Production and Plant Sciences – An exhibit that shows learning about the growth, use, and value of field crops, plant growth, soils and soil fertility, or any other learning related to Crop Productions and Plant Sciences.

Class 10220 – Conservation, Environment and Sustainability – An exhibit that shows the connections between humans and their environment including energy, energy conservation, stewardship, conservation, creating habitat, etc.

Class 10222 – Entomology – Any exhibit that shows learning form an entomology or bee project (no live specimens) that is an outgrowth or an entomology or bee project learning experience. Including specimen collections and may include products (ex: honey) or equipment as part of the display.

Class 10244 – Fish and Wildlife – Any exhibit that shows learning about a fish and/or wildlife project or program such as identification, habitats, harvest, taxidermy, etc. Any specimens must have been legally taken and must include information about date and location of harvest, and who the specimen was acquired from if not self-harvested. Feral pigs are NOT permitted in taxidermy exhibits.

Class 10226 – Forestry – Any exhibit, including collections, that show learning from participation in a forestry project or program.

Class 10230 – Horticulture and Plant Science – An exhibit that shows learning about the growth, use, and value of plants, soils, small fruit production, vegetable and flower gardens, plant nutrition, careers, etc. (Garden crops and herbs are exhibited in the 4-H horticulture department)

Class 10235 – Home Grounds improvement – An exhibit that shows learning about landscape plans, selection of landscape plants, ornamental garden features, home yard improvement, storage sheds, careers, etc.

Class 10240 – Outdoor Adventures – An exhibit that shows learning about backpacking, biking, camping, canoeing, fishing, hiking, or other outdoor activities.

Class 10250 – Safety and Education in Shooting Sports – An exhibit that shows learning about safe and responsible use of firearms and archery equipment or wildlife management. (The exhibit may not include actual firearms; archery equipment allowed if tips are removed).

Class 10260 – Other Agriculture and Natural Resources – An exhibit that shows learning about agriculture or natural resources and does not fit in any of the other classes listed above.

Science, Engineering, & Technology

Exhibitors entered in the 4-H Science, Engineering and Technology classes may not enter in similar FFA Ag Mechanics classes and vice-versa

Class 10610 – Mechanics – Any exhibit that shows skills or learning about general mechanics or engineering solutions or that involve a combination of skills.

Class 10612 – Automotive – Repaired or restored vehicle (Note: vehicles will be on display at the Iowa State Fair one day only, tentatively Thursday, August 11th)

Class 10613 – Automotive – Educational display showing learning about an automotive idea including automotive maintenance, operations, safety or automotive systems.

Class 10614 – Electric – Constructed or repaired article or educational display that shows skills or learning about electric wiring, appliances, lighting, electrical energy source, safety, etc.

Class 10615 – Small Engine – Repaired or restored operating engine or educational display or other type of exhibit that shows skills or learning about small engines. This class includes repaired or restored lawn tractors, small motorcycles, go-karts, etc.

Class 10616 – Tractor – Repaired or restored tractor. Note: A conference judging opportunity for exhibitors or restored tractors in class 10616 will be offered during exhibit chick-in. (Conference judging may not be available

during all check-in times). Tractors will be displayed outside throughout the Iowa State Fair.

Class 10618 – Welding – Welded item or display that shows skills or learning about welding.

Class 10620 – Woodworking – Any exhibit that shows learning about wood, woodworking techniques, and safe uses of woodworking tools and machines. Exhibits may include newly constructed or refinished/reclaimed/restored wood items.

Class 10630 – Science, Engineering, & Technology – Any exhibit that shows learning about or helps explain how science and technology help us interact with the world. Topics include aerospace, biological and chemical sciences, computers and networking, earth and climate, geospatial mapping (GPS/GIS), or any other application of Science, Engineering, or Technology

Class 10632 – Aerospace – Educational display or other exhibit (including flyable models) showing learning about an aerospace idea or topic.

Class 40301 – Vegetable Container Display – The vegetable display must include at least five but not more than seven different kinds of vegetables (from classes in Division 401/402 above) grown in the exhibitor’s garden and will not include flowers, herbs, other ornamental or decorative items or other plants. More than one variety of any particular vegetable can be displayed; however, not more than four items of the same vegetable can be displayed. For example, four tomatoes would constitute one vegetable, e.g., one large red slicing, one cherry tomato, one yellow tomato, and one processing tomato. **The container display will be reduced one placing if it contains more than four specimens of any one kind of vegetable, e.g., more than four beans.** The amount of produce exhibited should fit into the container and specimens may not overflow onto the table. The vegetables should be prepared for exhibit as instructed in 4H-462, “Harvesting and Preparing Vegetables for Exhibit”. Any decorative basket, box, or container, not larger than one-half bushel can be used. The exhibit will be judged 75% for the cultural perfection of the vegetables and 25% for decorative arrangement. A special variety card (orange) will be provided and **MUST** accompany the exhibit with the requested information. In addition, an individual exhibit tag (tan) must be attached.

Class 40302 – First Year Exhibitor’s Class – Plate of mixed vegetables exhibited by a 4-H member who has never participated in the Iowa State Fair 4-H Horticulture Show before. Plate is to consist of one tomato, one onion, one pepper, and one each of two other vegetables of the exhibitor’s choice from classes in Division 401/402. A special variety card (orange) will be provided and **MUST** accompany the exhibit with the requested information. In addition, an individual exhibit tag (tan) **MUST** be attached.

Class 40303 – Salsa Tray – This tray must include vegetable specimens (grown by the exhibitor) to make salsa. The salsa tray must contain two specimens each of tomatoes, peppers, and onions. In addition, it must contain two specimens each of two other vegetables (from classes in Division 401/402 above) that are included in the salsa recipe. A copy of the recipe card must be included in the tray. A special variety card (orange) will be provided and **MUST** accompany the exhibit with the requested information. In addition, an individual exhibit tag (tan) **MUST** be attached. The amount of the produce exhibited **MUST** fit on the special salsa tray that will be provided.

Class 40304 – County Vegetable Platter – This team platter consists of vegetables from at least two 4-H exhibitors from the same county who already are exhibiting vegetables at the Iowa State Fair 4-H Horticulture classes (#’s

40102 through 40648). A county may enter more than one platter, but an individual exhibitor can only participate in one county platter exhibit. A platter must include 5 different kinds of vegetables and must include 2 tomatoes, 2 onion, and 2 other kinds of vegetables from the following list: 2 beets, 2 carrots, 2 cucumbers, 2 potatoes, or 2 summer squash. A special variety card (orange) will be provided and MUST accompany the exhibit with the requested information. In addition, each exhibitor contributing to the county platter will attach an individual exhibit tag (tan). The amount of produce exhibited MUST fit on the special county platter that will be provided.

Class 40305 – Vegetables of the Same Color Platter – This platter consists of 4 kinds of vegetables and/or herbs that are the same color (of the exhibitor’s choice – from classes in Division 401/402/404). For example, a red platter could have red slicing tomato, red cherry tomato, red bell pepper, and cayenne pepper; while a green platter could include green variety eggplant, green bell pepper, green beans, and green kohlrabi. There is no limit to the number of individual specimens; however, the amount of produce exhibited MUST fit on the special platter that will be provided. Platters will be judged 75% on exhibit quality and 25% on accuracy of hue and appearance. Each exhibitor may enter up to two color platters and each must represent a different color group.

A special variety card (orange) will be provided and MUST accompany the exhibit with the requested information. In addition, an individual exhibit tag (tan) MUST be attached.

Creative Arts

Entries due Tuesday, July 26th at Wibholm Hall at assigned time for each club. Exhibitors may show five entries in this department.

Class 10310 – Music – An exhibit that shows learning about musical performance, composition and arrangement, instruments, musical styles, or history.

Class 10320 – Photography – an exhibit, either photo(s) or an educational display, that shows learning about photography from choosing a camera to modifying your photo. Still photos only.

1. Photographs may be either black and white or color. They may be processed from negatives, or digital cameras and computer manipulation programs. Photographs must have been taken since your county fair of the previous year.
2. Photographs should be a minimum of 5” x 7”. Finished size (including mounting/matting) of single photographs may not exceed 11” x 14”. Exception: Panoramic photos must not exceed 24” in length.
3. All photographs must be printed on photographic paper and must be mounted and/or matted.
4. Mounted photographs can be (a) flush-mounted [no board showing] on mounting board, or (b) with mount borders [window may or flat mount directly on board]. Exhibitors may cut their own mounting boards, use ready-cut window mats or have matting done professionally.
 - a. 4-Hers are responsible to design decisions such as border, color, and size. **Framed photographs (including floating frames) will not be judged.**
5. A series is a group of photographs or slides [3 to 5] that are related or tell a step-by-step story. Photographs must be mounted together in story order or sequence. Slides should be numbered. Finished size of individual photographs in a series should not exceed 6’ by 8’.
6. Digitally altered photos should include a copy of the photo before changes.
7. Subject matter of photographs must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting.
8. Photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.
9. Iowa State Fair 4-H photography exhibitors must use the Photo Exhibit Label to provide required information for photo exhibits.
10. Exhibitors entered in 4-H Photography are not eligible to exhibit in the FFA Photography Show and vice versa.

Class 10340 – Creative Photography – A single photograph or photographic image that has been created with an alternative photographic process, or a photograph that was creatively edited or modified beyond reality in a creative, imaginative, and experimental way to make it more interesting and visually engaging. Could be a composite of multiple overlapped photographs.

1. Photograph/image may be mounted/matted or submitted as a digital image.
2. Photograph/image if mounted must be mounted on foam core no smaller than 4” x 4” and no larger than 10” x 10” in height and width. No matting and no framing are allowed, put your creativity into the photography!
3. Photograph/image can be created from film negative, digital negative, or digitally manipulated in computer.
4. Photograph must be on photo paper, canvas, or other flat material.
5. Exhibit must have Photo Exhibit Label on back with required information for photo exhibits. Include information about the processes used.
6. Subject matter must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting, photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.

Class 10345 – Photography Idea/Educational Display – An exhibit that demonstrates learning about photography that does not fit into any previous photography class. This includes photos printed on canvas, fabric, ceramic, etc. as part of an educational display showing learning about printing techniques, display, merchandising, etc.

Class 10540 – Digital Storytelling – Entries will be entered through Personal Development class 10540 – Any exhibit that demonstrates the application of technology to produce a creative movie/film/video. Exhibits may include a finished movie or video, creation of a detailed storyboard, editing techniques using digital video software, production techniques, or other display to share what was learned. Copyright permission must be obtained for any non-original material included as a part of a film/movie/video.

Class 10350 – Visual Arts Original Art – An exhibit that shows learning through creation of original art. Original art is one-of-a-kind, non-replicable design of your creation. By using one medium or a combination, an individual creates an authentic work of art that is not recognizable as another’s work. You must explain the application of the most relevant design element(s) and art principle(s) featured in this exhibit. Describe your inspirations, reasons, feelings, and/or motives for creating this work of art.

Class 10355 – Visual Arts Design, Process, or Technique Exploration – This exploration class emphasizes process and provides an individual the opportunity to explore a medium, practice a skill, or study and apply elements and principles of art and design. An explanation of the application of design elements or art principles used when making the exhibit must be included. This exhibit may be an object, portfolio, display, poster, or organized sketchbook. If a non-original design source is used, its origin (where the idea was found any pictures, sketches, etc.) must still be credited, acknowledged, or have copyright permission obtained. See visual arts special rule #5.

Class 10360 – Visual Arts – Other Visual Art Ideas/Topics – Exhibits might include the study and research about an individual artist, style, craft, business, or marketing process, planning group tour, career options, etc.

1. Items entered must be ready for display in the home, gallery, or intended final display location: pictures framed, wall hangings, and pictures ready to hang, etc. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command Strips or other quick attach products are usually not adequate hangers. Items not ready for display will be dropped one ribbon placing.
2. Exhibits made from kits or performed mold will not be accepted. Exception: Preformed molds (greenware, whiteware) may be used to provide the appropriate surface for a process technique or application of original design.
3. If the exhibit is a finished art object, the source or inspiration of the design, design sketches, or other process for creating the object and design must be included. For additional information see the Visual Arts and Design Elements & Art principles Exhibit Tip Sheets at www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/exhibit-tip-sheets.
4. If the exhibit is a finished art object information must be included explaining the application of design elements and art principles of design elements and art principles used in creation of the work.
5. Original works of art must be a creative expression of a design unique to the artist or represent a significant modification to an existing design to make a new and original statement by the artist.
6. Exhibition of derivative works created by a 4-H'er is prohibited without written permission of the original copyright holder/owner. Use of copyrighted or trademarked designs, images, logos, or materials in 4-H visual arts exhibits is prohibited unless written permission has been obtained from the copyright or trademark holder/owner. For additional

Family and Consumer Sciences

Exhibitors may show five entries in this department

Class 10410 – Child Development – An exhibit that shows learning about children. Examples: childcare, growth and development, safety and health, children with special needs, and careers in child development. Exhibits that include items intended for use with children (books, toys, learning games, babysitting kits, etc.) should include information about what you have learned 1) about children while creating and using the exhibit or 2) what the child(ren) learned from use of the item(s) in the exhibit.

Class 10420 – Clothing and Fashion – Construction/Sewn Garments & Accessories – A constructed garment or accessory (sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans.

Class 10422 – Clothing and Fashion – Purchased Garments & Accessories – Purchased garments or accessories that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans.

Class 10424 – Clothing and Fashion – Other Idea/Educational Exhibits – Any other educational exhibit that shows learning about clothing and fashion including but not limited to design illustrations, exploration of clothing styles, careers, clothing care, etc.

Clothing and Fashion Special Rules:

1. Outfits or accessories which will be worn during the Awardrobe Clothing Event may NOT be entered as a 4-H Iowa State Fair exhibit.
2. Exhibits in classes 10420 and 10422 must include information about application of design elements and art principles. Exhibits in class 10424 should include information about application of design elements and art principles if appropriate for the exhibit.

Class 10430 – Consumer Management – an exhibit that shows learning through savvy budgeting, comparison shopping, money management, and consumer rights and responsibilities.

Class 10440 – Food & Nutrition – Prepared Product – An exhibit of a prepared food product that shows skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating and choosing healthy foods, or safety practices through the making of a prepared or preserved food product. See *Food & Nutrition Special Rules* below and HS 76

Class 10442 – Food & Nutrition – Preserved Product – An exhibit of a preserved food product that shows skills or learning about food preservation through the making of a prepared or preserved food product. Processed honey may be exhibited in this class. See *Food & Nutrition Special Rules* below and HS 76 “Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs – Quick Reference Guide” at <https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/6434> for additional information regarding prepared food products.

Class 10445 – Food & Nutrition – Educational Display – An educational exhibitor (poster, report, display that shows skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating and choosing healthy foods, meal planning/preparation and service, safety practices, or food preservation. See *Food & Nutrition Special Rules* below and HS 76 “Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs – Quick Reference Guide” at <https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/6434> for additional information regarding prepared food products. Exhibits showing learning about meal planning and service must include a menu.

Food & Nutrition Special Rules:

Superintendent: Kelli Wilmes

1. Any exhibit considered to be a food safety risk or portray a food safety risk will not be accepted, judged, or displayed.
2. All food products/exhibits should be appropriate for human consumption.
3. Food product exhibits must be prepared, baked, or cooked using only food grade utensils and containers.
4. Products that require refrigeration will not be accepted, judged, or displayed.
5. Meat jerky products are prohibited.
6. The recipe must be included for any prepared food exhibit, credit the source of the recipe.
7. Preserved foods must include the Food Preservation Exhibit Label. Only food processed after August 1, 2021 is acceptable. Current USDA and/or Iowa State University guidelines for home food preservation must be used. Processed honey must include the Honey Exhibit Label.
8. Preserved food exhibits must include two product samples. One will be opened for evaluation and discarded; the second will be placed on

display and returned to the exhibitor. All perishable food products will be discarded when removed from display.

9. Prepared foods should be placed on a firm disposable plate or flat cardboard. Place food product exhibit in a resealable plastic bag with entry tag fastened outside the bag.
 - a. Cookies, cupcakes, bars, muffins, rolls, etc – four (4) to six (6) items
 - b. Cakes, loafs, pies, etc. – one (1) whole product
10. The use of alcoholic beverages in the preservation or production of 4-H food exhibits is NOT permitted.

Class 10450 – Health – An exhibit that shows learning through food choices, physical activity, safe activities, and skills such as first aid and CPR, careers, and healthy lifestyle choices.

Class 10460 – Home Improvement – An exhibit that shows learning in planning, improving, and caring for your home living space, including extended personal living areas immediately adjacent to the home. Exhibits may include new or refinished/reclaimed/restored items. Exhibits showing learning about home design, furniture, home accessories, and fabrics must include information about how design elements and art principles were applied.

Home Improvement Special Rules:

1. Items entered must be ready for display in the home: pictures framed, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang, etc. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command Strips or other quick attach products are usually not adequate hangers. Items not ready for display will be dropped one ribbon placing.
2. **Exhibit write-up/information must include source of inspiration and/or references indicating where the idea or information was obtained, given credit to original author(s)/artist(s).**

Class 10470 – Sewing and Needle Arts – Constructed Item – (sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning and skill in sewing, knitting, crocheting, or other needle arts. May include the construction of household items such as pillowcases, curtains, table runners, quilts, wall hangings, or other items. Exhibits in this class are not intended to be worn by humans.

Class 10472 – Sewing and Needle Arts – Other Ideas/Educational Exhibits – Any other educational exhibit that shows learning about sewing and needle arts including but not limited to construction techniques, use and care of fabrics and fibers, design illustrations, decorative processes, careers.

Note: Exhibits in classes 10470 and 10472 should include information about application of design elements and art principles if appropriate for the exhibit.

Class 10480 – Other Family and Consumer Science – An exhibit that demonstrates learning about a family and consumer science topic that does not fit any previous Family & Consumer Science class listed.

Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs - Quick Reference Guide

Food and nutrition exhibits involve fun and engaging food science and nutrition experiments.

Exhibits should be prepared with food safety in mind. Using unsafe ingredients or recipes could cause judges who evaluate exhibits to become ill. Plan ahead for a successful fair experience. Use these guidelines to help you select an acceptable product for exhibit, find an approved recipe source, and identify the appropriate preparation method.



Preserved Foods - Keys to Success

1 Approved Recipe Source

Between 1994-2015, significant changes have been made in home food preservation processes. As a result, recipes handed down from previous generations, found in older cookbooks, or published online may not be safe to use or exhibit.

In order to qualify for state fair in Iowa, home preserved food exhibits must follow current preservation guidelines and use an approved, tested recipe.

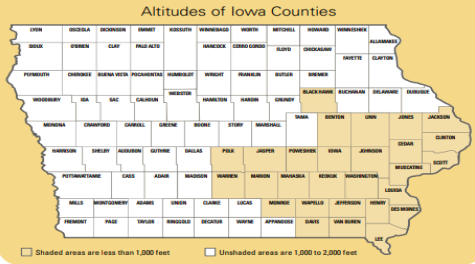

If pressure canning is necessary, be sure to USE A PRESSURE CANNER NOT A PRESSURE COOKER. A canner will hold at least 4 quart-sized jars.

Adjust the processing time based on the altitude of your location.

Special Exhibition – Class 10490 - \$10 Meal Challenge

Create a balanced, nutritious meal for a family of four (4) that includes a serving from each of the five food groups with a budget of \$10.

- Each county may enter one (1) exhibit in this class.
- All entries will receive an evaluation and ribbon.
- Exhibit may be from an individual or group effort.
- The meal must serve four (4) people and total expense on receipt(s) must not exceed \$10.
- The meal must include a serving for each person from each of the five (5) food groups
 - Fruit, Vegetable, Protein, Grain, Dairy
- The exhibit will be a poster (maximum size of 20” by 30”) that includes:
 - The menu (including portion size)
 - Meal type (breakfast, lunch, dinner)
 - Grocery receipt(s)
 - Photos of the shopping experience, food preparation, and the meal
 - Attach a copy of the \$10 Meal Challenge worksheet to the back of the poster

Personal Development

Exhibitors may show three entries in this department

Class 10510 – Citizenship and Civic Engagement – An exhibit that shows learning about or contributing to your community, your country, or your world.

Class 10520 – Communication – An exhibit that shows learning about written, oral, and visual communication skills in their many forms. Including learning from participation in Theatre Arts projects or programs including puppets, stage design, etc. May include original creative writing, poetry, fiction, and non-fiction, etc.

Class 10530 – 4-H Poster Communication Exhibit – Special poster exhibit to visually tell a story or idea about 4-H to the general public. Exhibitors must use one of the following themes:

- 4-H is..... (open to 4-H'ers interpretation)
- Join 4-H
- Find Your Spark (4-H.org national marketing theme)
- Building the Future (Iowa 4-H Youth Conference Theme)
- Find Your Fun (in 4-H) (variation of Iowa State Fair Theme)

Poster Communication Special Rules:

1. Only one poster per 4-H'er may be entered
2. All posters must be designed on, or affixed to, standard poster board or foam core board – size minimum of 14” by 20” or maximum of 15” by 22”.
3. Posters may be vertical horizontal. Posters may be any medium: watercolor, ink, crayon, acrylic, charcoal, oils, collage.
4. Posters CANNOT be 3-dimensional. Materials used to make the poster may NOT extend more than 1/8 inch above the poster or foam core board.
5. Each poster must have the completed Poster Exhibit Entry Form attached to the back.
6. Posters cannot use copyrighted material to exact copies of other promotional designs, such as the Iowa 4-H Youth Conference theme logo.
7. 4-H'ers may include the 4-H clover in the poster.
8. All 4-H Communication Poster participants will be given Certificates of Recognition and written evaluation comments. Outstanding posters will receive Seals of Merit. Superior posters will receive Seals of Excellence.

Class 10540 – Digital Storytelling – (See also Creative Arts) Any exhibit that demonstrates the application of technology to produce a creative movie/film/video. Exhibits may include a finished movie or video, creation of a detailed storyboard, editing techniques using digital video software, production techniques, or other display to share what was learned. Copyright permission must be obtained for any non-original material included as part of a film/movie/video.

Class 10550 – Leadership – An exhibit that shows learning about leadership skills and influencing others in a positive way.

Class 10560 – Self-Determined – An exhibit that shows learning as part of your 4-H adventure and does not fit any other class.

Awardrobe

Superintendent: Allie Wellhausen

Jr Superintendent: Aubrey Herzberg

1. Each youth may only participate in the 4-H Awardrobe Clothing Event with one entry in one class per year. However, youth may be selected to participate multiple years for any given class, even if they participated in that class in previous years.
2. Each county may send that following number of participants in each class to represent their county, selected from each of the county's events:
 - a. Fashion Revue Class: Four participants total with no more than two (2) participants with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume).
 - b. \$15 Challenge Class: Four participants total with no more than two (2) participants with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume).
 - c. Clothing Selection Class: Four participants total with no more than two (2) participants with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume).
3. The categories in each class are simply for entry limit purposes. All entries in each class will be judged together.
4. Participants must be in the senior 4-H designated level (completed grades 9 – 12 in 2022).
5. Outfits or accessories which will be worn during the State 4-H Awardrobe Clothing Event may not be entered as another 4-H Iowa State Fair exhibit.

6. Participants must bring the garment or outfit they purchased or created, and accessories, to all State 4-H Awardrobe Clothing Event
7. Participants should submit only the materials requested for each class (report form and photo – for ALL classes – plus a receipt for \$15 challenge). If additional materials are sent with the entry or brought to the conference judging, they will not be considered.
8. Participant report forms must be uploaded by county staff no later than July 31st. Participants should abide by county deadlines for submitting paperwork for entry.
9. All participants must participate in all Awardrobe Clothing Event activities at the times scheduled for their county unless the 4-H member is involved in another Iowa State Fair 4-H activity at the same time with a non-flexible schedule. Pre-approval is required prior to July 31st.

Fashion Revue

Class 3011 – Junior Fashion Revue – Grades 4-6

Class 3012 – Intermediate Fashion Revue – Grades 7-8

Class 121 – Senior Fashion Revue – Grades 9-12

Fashion Revue Rules:

1. The purpose of this category is to encourage the construction of a personal garment or outfit.
2. Consideration is given to fit, color, style, suitability, quality of construction, stage presentation, and required care.
3. Youth participants will model a garment or outfit they constructed, hand-knitted, machine-knitted, or crocheted during the current 4-H year.
4. A garment or outfit consists of one to three pieces such as, but not limited to party clothes, tailored suits, vest, slacks, shirt, skirt, active sportswear, and/or coats.
5. Blouses, shirts, and sweaters are usually considered garments. If they are used to complete an outfit, they may be constructed or selected.
6. All other accessories and undergarments may be constructed or selected.

Clothing Selection

Class 3021 – Junior Clothing Selection – Grades 4-6

Class 3022 – Intermediate Clothing Selection – Grades 7-8

Class 122 – Senior Clothing Selection – Grades 9-12

Clothing Selection Rules:

1. The purpose of this category is to select and/or purchase an outfit that represents the 4-H member's goal and intended use for the selected outfit.
2. Judging is based on fit, color, style, suitability, quality and construction features, stage presentation, required care, and cost comparison.
3. There is no consideration in the judging on the amount spent, only in the process of record keeping and reflection on the cost of the individual items as part of the process.
4. Outfits may be purchased at a department store, boutique, online store, sidewalk sales, retail shops, or mall stores. Outfits may also be purchased at garage sales or other secondhand venues at any price point. Outfits may be gifts, hand-me-downs, relative or friend's modern or vintage clothing, or existing personal clothing, as long as the 4-H member selected the item as part of this specific outfit for the stated purpose.
5. Home-sewn clothing that was not sewn specifically for the participant are acceptable, such as purchases from a used clothing store.

The \$15 Challenge

Class 3031 – Junior \$15 Challenge – Grades 4-6

Class 3032 – Intermediate \$15 Challenge – Grades 7-8

Class 123 – Senior \$15 Challenge – Grades 9-12

Challenge Rules:

1. This category is designed to expand the 4-H member's shopping experience to shopping venues emphasizing recycling, reducing, and reusing. Outfits must be purchased at a garage sale, consignment store, Goodwill, Salvation Army, or similar place.
2. Online venues are allowed, must be second-hand in nature. Shopping and handling are not included in the total calculations.
3. Traditional shopping venues may not be used, regardless of a low regular or sale price. Hand-me-downs or clothing as gifts do not qualify for this class.
4. Fifteen dollars is the purchase price limit including tax. However, some secondhand stores and bevues do not typically charge sales tax.
5. Receipt(s) for every item included as part of the calculated total must be submitted with the entry. A garage sale receipt can be a piece of paper with the name of the location such as "Jane Joe garage sale", date, amount paid, and signature of person selling at the sale. If the outfit was free at a garage sale, "free" can be listed on the report form

and on the receipt. Failure to provide receipts will be reflected in the evaluation.

6. An outfit consists of major clothing pieces such as a shirt and pants or a dress. Shoes, undergarments, and accessories are not included in the \$15 purchase price limit.
7. Alterations are permitted on achieve a desired look or fit.
8. There are no additional considerations for an outfit that totals less than \$15.
9. The outfit pieces should be purchased to meet the 4-H member's goal or intended use for the purchased outfit, and the 4-H member should have had an experience in choosing shopping alternatives, evaluating fit, quality and construction features, price, and cost comparison.

4-H Communication Event Program

Superintendent: Diane Ferguson

Jr Superintendent: Ella Johnson

The department is open to youth who are participating in the 4-H Youth Development programs conducted by Iowa State University Extension.

All participants are responsible to read and comply with the Iowa State Fair Communication Event program rules, 4-H General Rules and Regulations, and specific program event rules and regulations.

PURPOSE: The Communication Event program provides opportunities for 4-H youth to develop their personal communication skills by sharing talents, knowledge, or information with others. The events provide a series of development experiences for different age levels.

General Communication Event Program Rules and Regulations:

1. 4-H'ers who have completed 5th through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2022 are eligible to participate at the Iowa State Fair. Exception: Share-The-Fun and Extemporaneous Speaking – See event rules for age guidelines.
2. Educational Presentations and Working Exhibits may be given by one or more 4-H'ers. Teams consisting of youth of mixed grades will be subject to the time limits based on the grade of the member in the

- highest grade level (i.e., a team with a 5th grader and an 8th grader will use the times for the intermediate/senior class).
3. Topics selected by the 4-H'er(s) should be an outgrowth of his/her 4-H experience(s). Topics should be appropriate for presentation to a general audience.
 4. Educational Presentation, Working Exhibit, and Extemporaneous Speaking participants cannot be involved in another event (communication event, clothing programs, livestock show or judging) during the half-day they are scheduled to participate in their program. Share-The-Fun participants cannot be involved in another event from 30 minutes prior to the beginning of the schedule show to 15 minutes following the show.
 6. All participants are required to attend the scheduled orientation session prior to participating in their event. (Times subject to change).
 - a. Educational Presentation: 8:30am or 1:00pm (August 11-20)
 - b. Working Exhibits: 8:30am or 1:00pm (August 11-20)
 - c. Share-The-Fun: 20 minutes prior to the show, normally Noon and 5:00pm – times may vary (August 11-20)
 - d. Extemporaneous Speaking: 8:30am or 1:00pm Monday, August 15th/Tuesday, August 16th/Thursday, August 18th; 8:30am Sunday, August 21st
 7. Only presenters are allowed in the Educational Presentation, Working Exhibit, and Extemporaneous Speaking Preparation rooms.
 8. Educational Presentation and Working Exhibit participants will be involved in a “peer evaluation program”.
 9. All 4-H Educational Presentation, Working Exhibit, and Extemporaneous Speaking participants will be given Certificates of Recognition and written evaluation comments. Seals of Merit will be presented to those giving outstanding presentations. Seals of Excellence will be presented to those giving superior presentations. Share-The-Fun participants will receive participation ribbons and a written critique of the performance. Participants are expected to be present for awards given at the close of the event session.
 10. Participants in the 4-H Communication Programs are expected to wear appropriate clothing representative of the 4-H Youth Program and/or the topic of the presentation.
 11. 4-H'ers must use sanitary and safe procedures and methods at all times. Educational Presentations and Working Exhibits involving food must follow established food safety guideline.

12. **All participants are expected to comply with all copyright/trademark regulations. Copyrighted material may not be distributed without permission.**
13. A \$12.00 fee per entry will be billed to the county. Entries should be selected from a county communication event program.
14. Allocated premiums will be paid to counties for distribution based on the participation in the 4-H Educational Presentation, Working Exhibit, and Extemporaneous Speaking opportunities. There will be no premium allocations for Share-The-Fun.

Class 11100 – Educational Presentations – Provide an opportunity for 4-H’ers to demonstrate communication skills by presenting knowledge, information, or a process to an audience in order to gain a desired response.

Educational Presentation Rules:

1. Time limit: Junior Presentations (5th and 6th Grades) must not exceed 15 minutes. Intermediate/Senior Presentations (7th – 12th Grades) must not exceed 20 minutes. Presenters will be verbally told to “STOP” when they exceed the time limit.
2. Participants must turn in a completed Educational Presentation Report form during event check-in.
3. 4-H’ers may participate in one Educational Presentation per year at the Iowa State Fair
4. Presentation content must be the original work of the presenter(s). Extensive paraphrasing from other sources is prohibited. Use of brief quotations or excerpts of from other work(s) is permitted provided the source is identified.

Class 11200 – Working Exhibit – Provide an opportunity for 4-H’ers to communicate, interact with, and teach an audience in an informal and experiential way.

Work Exhibit Rules:

1. Time limit: All participants/teams will be scheduled for a 30-minute period.
2. Participants must turn in a completed Working Exhibit Report form during event check-in.
3. 4-H’ers may participate in one Working Exhibit per year at the Iowa State Fair.

Class 11300 – Share-The-Fun Program – Provide an opportunity for 4-H’ers to share their skills and talents before an audience purely for the sake of enjoyment.

Share-The-Fun Rules:

1. Eligibility: 4-H'ers who have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2022. Exception: If the Share-The-Fun act involves a whole club, the following criteria must be applied to determine if the club can be entered in the Share-The-Fun Program at the Iowa State Fair:
 - a. At least 80 percent of the performing group must have completed 5th through 12th grade in 2022.
2. **Share-The-Fun performance must not exceed six (6) minutes in length.**
3. Skits, songs, stunts, short one-act play, dance, and other entertainment will be acceptable. All performances must be acceptable. All performances must be appropriate for presentation to a general audience.
4. All performers must turn in a completed 4-H Share-The-Fun Report form at event check-in to confirm stage setup, cue music, etc.

Class 11400 – Extemporaneous Speaking Rules – Encourage the development of communication skills by providing an opportunity to think, organize thoughts, prepare a speech, and respond to questions when given a limited amount of preparation time.

Extemporaneous Speaking Rules:

1. Participants must be senior 4-H'ers – completed 9th through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2022.
2. Each county may enter a maximum of two entries: individuals may participate once per year at the Iowa State Fair.
3. Program format:
 - a. Thirty minutes before the program, each participant will draw three of the available topics, selecting one to speak on.
 - i. The selected topic will not be available to the other participants in the speaker's assigned room. The general nature of the topics will relate to 4-H. The other two topics drawn but not chosen will be returned to the available topics for the other participants.
 - b. A preparation room is to be used with one participant per speaking site admitted initially and one additional participant per speaking site admitted each 15 minutes as the program progresses. A participant may not leave the preparation room until it is time to speak, nor may a participant receive help

- from a parent, leader, other adult or any other youth. A program official will assist participants with the time requirements.
- c. All reference material will be screened by a program official on the following basis:
 - i. Participant may bring his/her own books, magazines, or newspaper clippings for reference during the thirty minutes of preparation.
 - ii. Reference material must be printed material such as book magazines (cannot be notes, outlines, or speeches prepared by the participant or by another person for use in this program).
 - iii. Some relevant reference materials will be available in the preparation room. This material will consist of historical material related to the 4-H program.
 - d. Each speech shall be the result of the 4-H'ers own efforts using approved reference material that a participant may bring to the preparation room. No other assistance may be provided. Plain note cards will be provided for each participant in the preparation room. If notes are used, the note cards provided must be used in delivering the speech.
 - e. Only notes made during the preparation period may be used.
 - f. Each speech shall be not less than four but no more than six minutes with five minutes additional time allowed for related questions, which shall be asked by the judge. The participant will be shown timecards in an ascending order (1, 2, 3, 4, 5) by the time keeper. "Stop" will be said at six minutes.
 - g. The program timekeeper will introduce each participant by name and the county he/she represents. The participant will be expected to introduce his/her speech by title only.
 - h. Participants are not permitted to use any props, gadgets, posters, or audiovisuals of any sort. A podium will be available.
4. Speeches will be evaluated using the following criteria:
- a. Content related to topic
 - b. Knowledge of the subject
 - c. Organization of material
 - d. Power of expression
 - e. Voice

- f. Stage presence
 - g. General effect
 - h. Response to questions
5. A judge's critique/conference with each participant will be included as a part of the program.

Class 10530 – 4-H Poster Communication Exhibit – Provide an opportunity for 4-H'ers to communicate with a **tell a story or idea visually** about 4-H to the general public using the non-verbal form of communication on a poster.

4-H Poster Communication Rules:

1. Only one poster per 4-H'ers may be entered.
2. All posters must be designed on, or affixed to, standard poster board or foam core board – size minimum 14" x 20" or maximum of 15" x 22"
3. Posters may be vertical or horizontal. Poster may be any medium: watercolor, ink, crayon, acrylic, charcoal, oils, collage.
4. Posters **cannot** be 3-dimensional. Materials used to make the poster may **not** extend more than 1.8 inch above the poster or foam core board.
5. Each poster **must** have the completed Poster Exhibit Entry Form attached to the back.
6. Posters **cannot** use copyrighted material or exact copies of other promotional designs, such as the Iowa 4-H Youth Conference theme logo.
7. 4-H'ers may include the 4-H clover in the poster.
8. The themes for "Communicating Through 4-H Posters" are:
 - a. 4-H is.... (Open to 4-H'ers interpretation)
 - b. Join 4-H
 - c. *Find Your Spark* (4-H.org national marketing theme)
 - d. *Building the Future* (Iowa 4-H Youth Conference Theme)
 - e. *Find Your Fun in 4-H* (variation of Iowa State Fair theme)
9. All 4-H Communication Poster participants will be given Certificates of Recognition and written evaluation comments. Outstanding posters will receive Seals of Merit. Superior posters will receive Seals of Excellence.

HISTORIAN BOOK

1. Conference judging will take place with 4-H club historian on Tuesday, July 26. Specific times will be sent to each club participating in judging.

2. Historian should bring the historian book with them when they are judged.
3. Each club may enter their historian book in these classes:
 - a. Current year (only this year's section will be judged)
 - b. Past years (will include the last 5 years in the judging)
4. Criteria for judging:
 - a. Picture of the club members and leaders (labeled with names and year)
 - b. Copy of club program or list of members' names
 - c. List of activities the club participated in
 - d. Monthly highlights of activities written out or reporter's news articles
 - e. Club pictures of projects
 - f. List of club awards
 - g. Neatness
 - h. Organization
5. Premium money will be on a \$2-\$1-\$0.50

1. Open to residents of Page County and adjacent counties.
2. Entry fee of \$1.00 per item.
3. Entries must be in place between 4:00-7:30p.m. on July 27, 2022 and remain in place until 10:00p.m. on July 30. By entering you item for Open Class judging you agree to the rules in the Page County Fair Book. The entry will remain on display in Wibholm Hall for the entirety of the Fair until designated project release time on Saturday Evening between 10:00p.m-11:00p.m. or Sunday afternoon between 1:00p.m.-1:30p.m. No Open Class exhibit may be removed before that time.
4. All entries must be completed pieces.
5. All entries must have been made by the exhibitor and shown in clean condition.
6. The Fair Board will use diligence to ensure the safety of articles after arrival and placement, but will in no case be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur.

7. Each entry will be judged on its own merit and will be awarded ribbons on basis of blue, red, and white capacity.
8. If the judge finds items of exceptional merit, he or she may award Champion, Reserve, and 3rd place ribbons. Decision of the judges is final.
9. Exhibits in this department will be divided into four sections.
10. An exhibitor may enter 3 items in each class to be judged.
11. There are classes for junior exhibitors and adult exhibitors.

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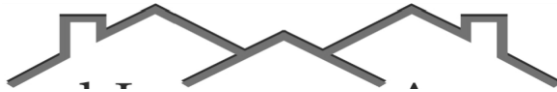
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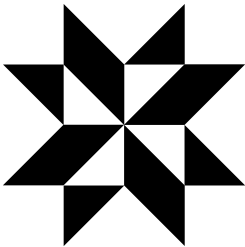
